**Call to Faith**- in the single volume book format- promotes dynamic, age-appropriate faith learning and life application for the young adolescents. The *Catechist/Teacher Editions* include optional activities, scripture background, justice and peace connections, liturgy links, and lectionary links.

**Call to Faith** website (calltofaith.osv.com) provides additional class activities; faith-sharing questions based on the Sunday cycle of readings; and supplemental instructional resources to help implement word, worship, and service in the catechetical experience.

The **Single volume student editions** help young adolescents deepen their faith through compelling stories, Scripture, appealing activities, and prayers.

### Unique to Call to Faith Grade 7 & 8 (Single Volume) are such features as:
